Chapter One What is Creative Writing?



Creative Writing in a Nutshell

- Creative writing expresses thoughts, feelings and emotions in a descriptive way.
- Instead of factual information, this form of writing uses words to create visual images in the minds of the readers.
- Usually, creative writing is associated with fiction (e.g., novels and short stories) that focus on character, dialogue, narrative, and plot.
- However, it can also be used as a technique to amplify nonfiction like biographies, memoirs, personal essays, or even technical documents such as a grant proposal.
- Basically, creative writing pulls illustrative sentences from the writer's imagination that recruits the five senses: sight, sound, smell, taste, and touch.
- Painting powerful images with words is partly achieved by using literary devices such as metaphor, simile, and other figures of speech, especially when writing novels, poems or essays.

- As mentioned earlier, creative writing is usually associated with fiction or poetry that highly talented and best-selling authors produce.
- However, regular people can use the same techniques whenever a written document requires more detail than a general email or memo.
- For example, police reports require complete descriptions that give the reader a mental image of exactly what happened. It would be really frustrating to read, "The perp ran and we caught him." *Who, what, when where, why, how?* The reader needs more information.
- Therefore, the point of creative writing is to help the reader clearly see what you see—with words—especially when a video or visual is unavailable.

Types of Creative Writing

Creative nonfiction includes autobiographies, biographies, memoirs, and personal essays, in addition to sales copy, social media and marketing content. Other familiar forms of creative writing are listed below:

- novels
- poems
- screenplays
- stage plays
- short stories
- songs
- television scripts
